## 2022-23 HUNTING GUIDELINES

Please print the email you received which serves as your written permission to hunt on SLT land. You can show the email to any game warden or other law enforcement official, and refer them to our office if they have any questions. Broadturn Farm is the only SLT location where you need to display your permit on your vehicle's dashboard.

- SLT property, while open to all, is private property. Please adhere to all state and federal laws, SLT Guidelines, and ethics pertaining to use of private property.
- All gear must be carry-in, carry-out for each trip. No gear is to be left overnight on SLT properties.
- Ladder stands are not permitted on SLT lands unless you meet SLT's accommodation guidelines and have explicit permission from SLT.
- No cutting, nailing, marking, or drilling of trees or other vegetation is permitted.
- Trapping is not permitted on SLT lands for the safety of pets and endangered New England Cottontail Rabbits.
- The Town of Scarborough does not permit rifle hunting (Ordinance 603) without permission from the landowner. In deference to that policy, we do not allow rifle hunting.

### Special Notes:

**Broadturn Farm:** Only certain portions of the property are open to hunting. See property map for details and refer to the small yellow signs in the woods that indicate the extent of the hunting area. Generally speaking, hunting is not permitted in the fields. Park only on paved roads. Don't park on or block the gravel roads – Broadturn Farm is an active farm! You're welcome to drive in on gravel roads to haul out a deer if you need to. You must display a BTF Hunting permit on your vehicle's dashboard.

**Libby River Farm:** Archery hunting only. Note that the hiking trail begins on land owned by Camp Ketcha, which does not allow hunting. You may carry your equipment across the Camp's property, but do not hunt until you are on SLT land, and of course, don't shoot onto the Camp's property. Public safety is our number one concern. Please use caution and courtesy when deciding where to hunt. As I'm sure you know, Maine has an excellent record of cooperation between hunters and non-hunters. Let's work together to make sure everyone stays safe!
